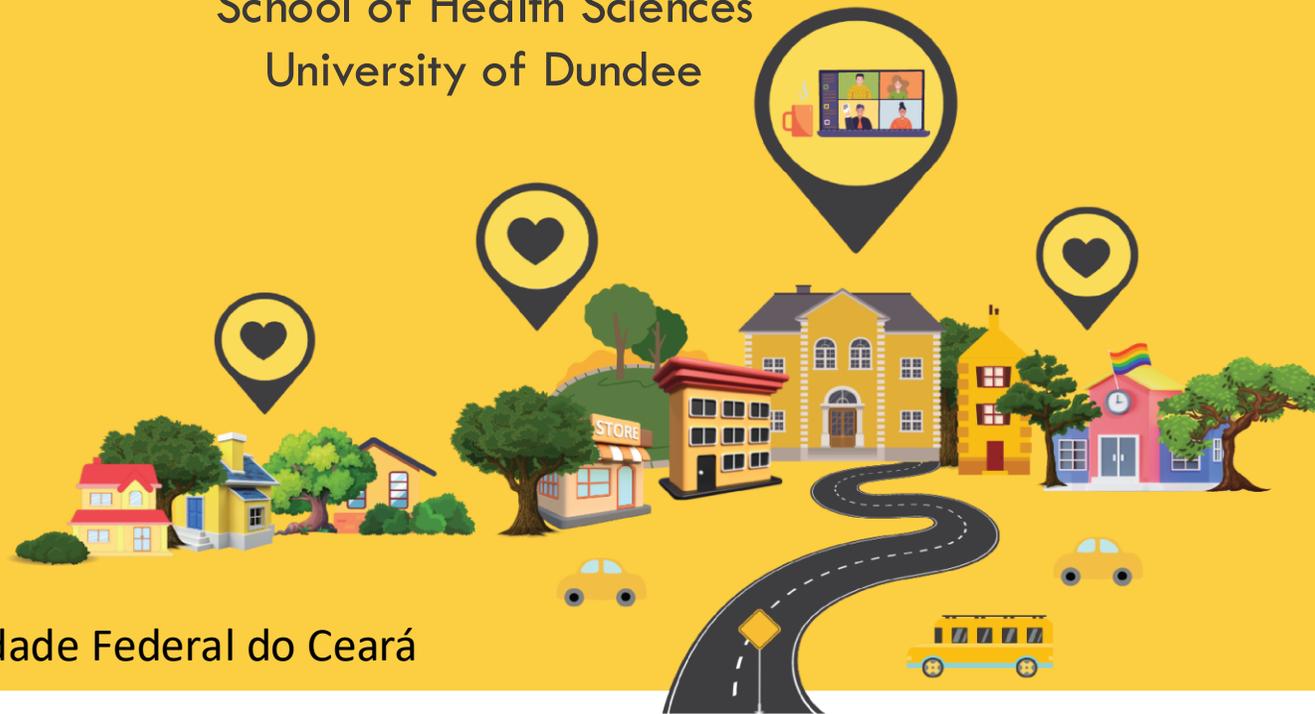

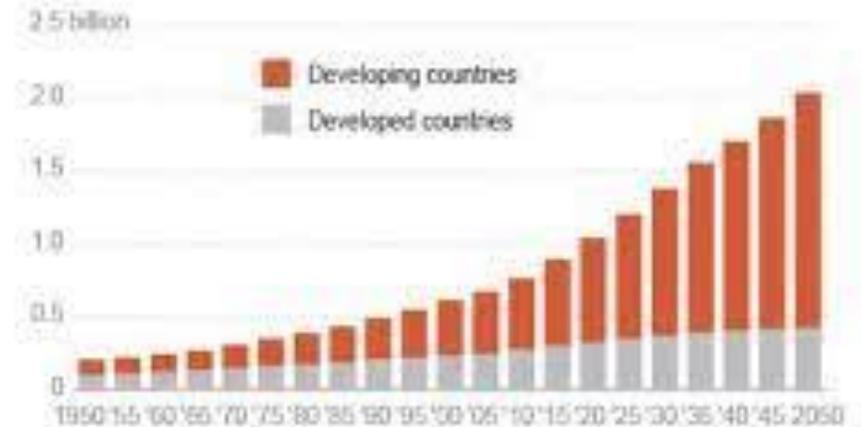
Community Inclusion in an Ageing World

- Ageing populations increasing globally
- Diverse older people
- Under served and under researched
 - 1.1 million UK older LGBT+.
 - 1.3 adult UK Learning Disabilities.
- Community inclusion
 - Improves mental and physical health
 - Decreased depression and anxiety
 - Community enrichment
 - Avoids age silos

World not ready for aging population

Digital Inclusion

UK government defines digital inclusion as:

"[...] making sure that people have the capability to use the internet to do things that benefit them day to day."

(Government Digital Service, *Government Digital Inclusion Strategy* (2014))

Digital Inclusion in an Ageing World



- Age and digital divide
 - 87% of adults ages 50 to 64 are online
 - 82% of those ages 65 to 69
 - 75% of those ages 70–74,
 - 80+ at 44%.
- BUT many struggle to access services, supports, everyday activity & enjoyment
- Older LGBT+ people with LD more excluded, esp if PMLD
- LGBT+ people may experience abuse, trolling, discrimination
- Under researched groups: What are their online experiences of digital inclusion/exclusion

Barriers to and facilitators of inclusion: people with LD

Aims

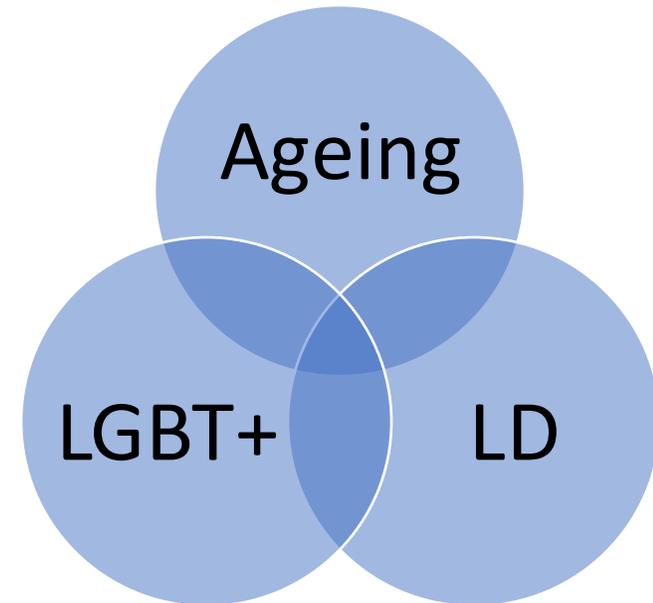
- I. Develop understandings of how to co-create inclusive physical, social, cultural, and virtual community spaces and places, services, and resources with and for mid-older aged people with IDD of different levels of abilities and LGBT+ people to enhance community participation
- II. Translate findings into inclusive policy and practice

Objectives

- i) Build collaborative, transdisciplinary partnerships to generate and analyse qualitative and quantitative data via survey, interviews, place study, social networks to understand LGBT+ and LD experiences of local and online inclusion and exclusion
- ii) Conduct workshops with professional and practitioner stakeholders to understand how local and online spaces and places can be made accessible to provide supportive, inclusive communities for mid-older people with LD and those who are LGBT+ (WP 2).
- iii) Generate potential solutions for the development of local / online community spaces and places which facilitate inclusion, minimise exclusion and encourage social and community participation in mid-older IDD and LGBT+, reducing layers of inequality
- iv) Translate and mobilise knowledge from research findings to provide strategies and recommendations to influence policy and practice

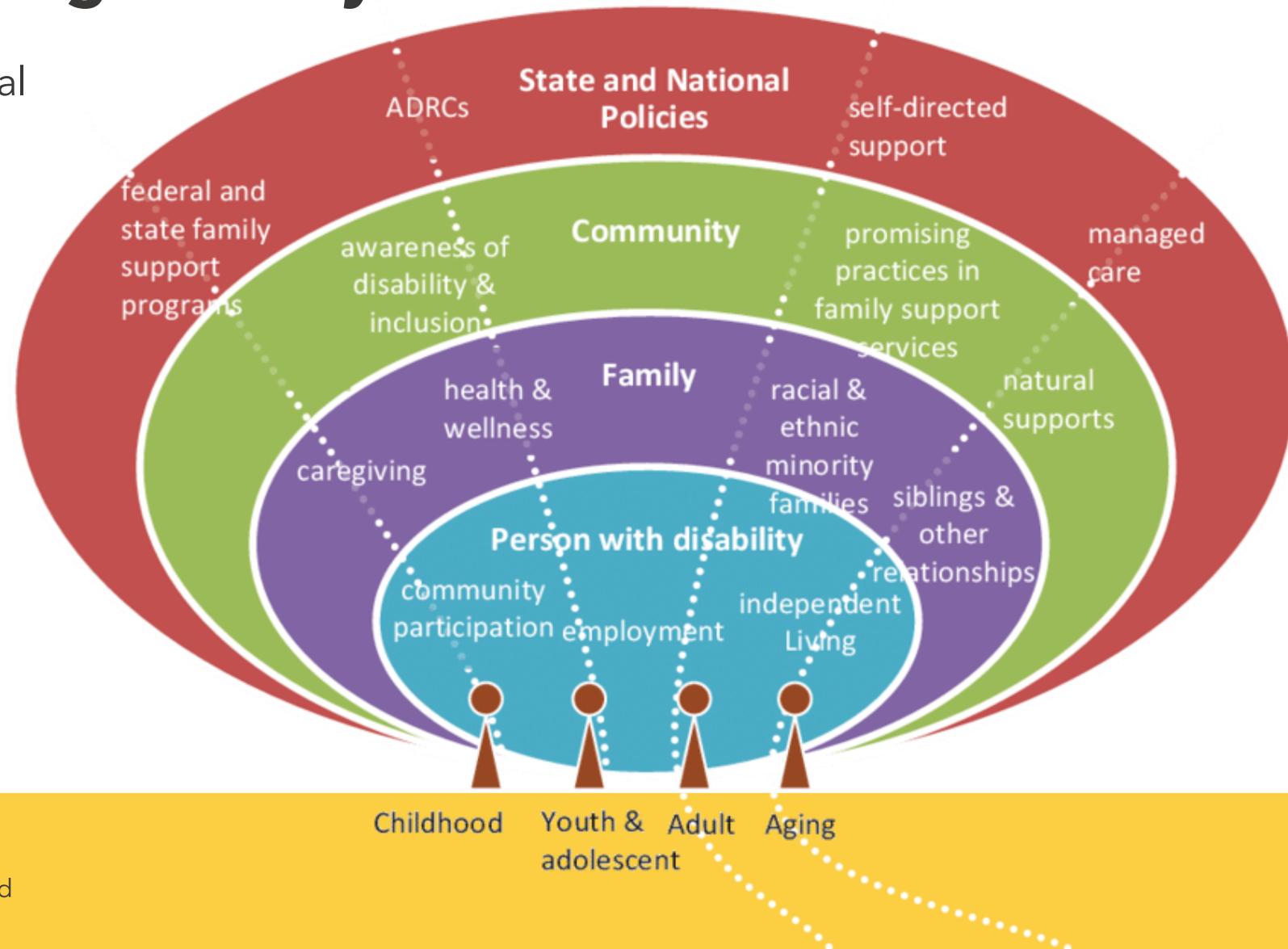

- Promote voices of diverse stakeholders
- Priorities experts by experience
- Full and equal partners in long term commitment
 - Expert-by-experience stakeholders
 - Sectoral stakeholders
 - International Reference Groups
- Brings experiential knowledge and resources
- Empowerment
- Opportunity for positive, relevant social change

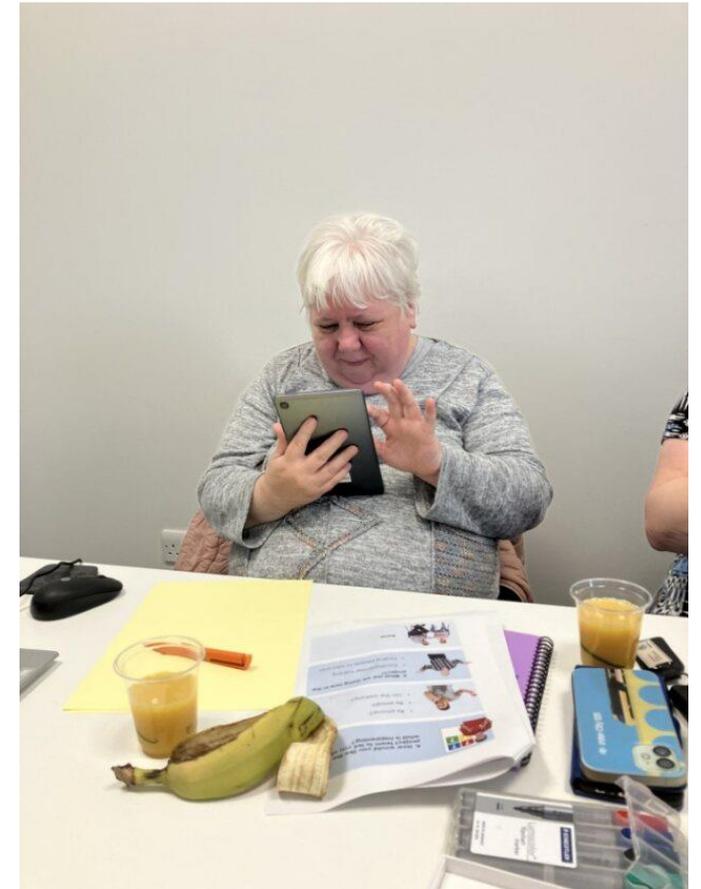

Dudley Voices for Choice

Inclusionary practice

- Proposal, tools/ instruments development with, by, and for mid-older people who are LGBT +/-with LD
- Ensure that
 - Marginalised voices are heard and experiences valued
 - Seat at/space in steering group meetings
 - Shared learning emphasised
 - Attention to communications: e.g. Easy Read
 - Constant consultations and feedback loop
- BUT ethical, cultural and scientific challenges

Co-researchers

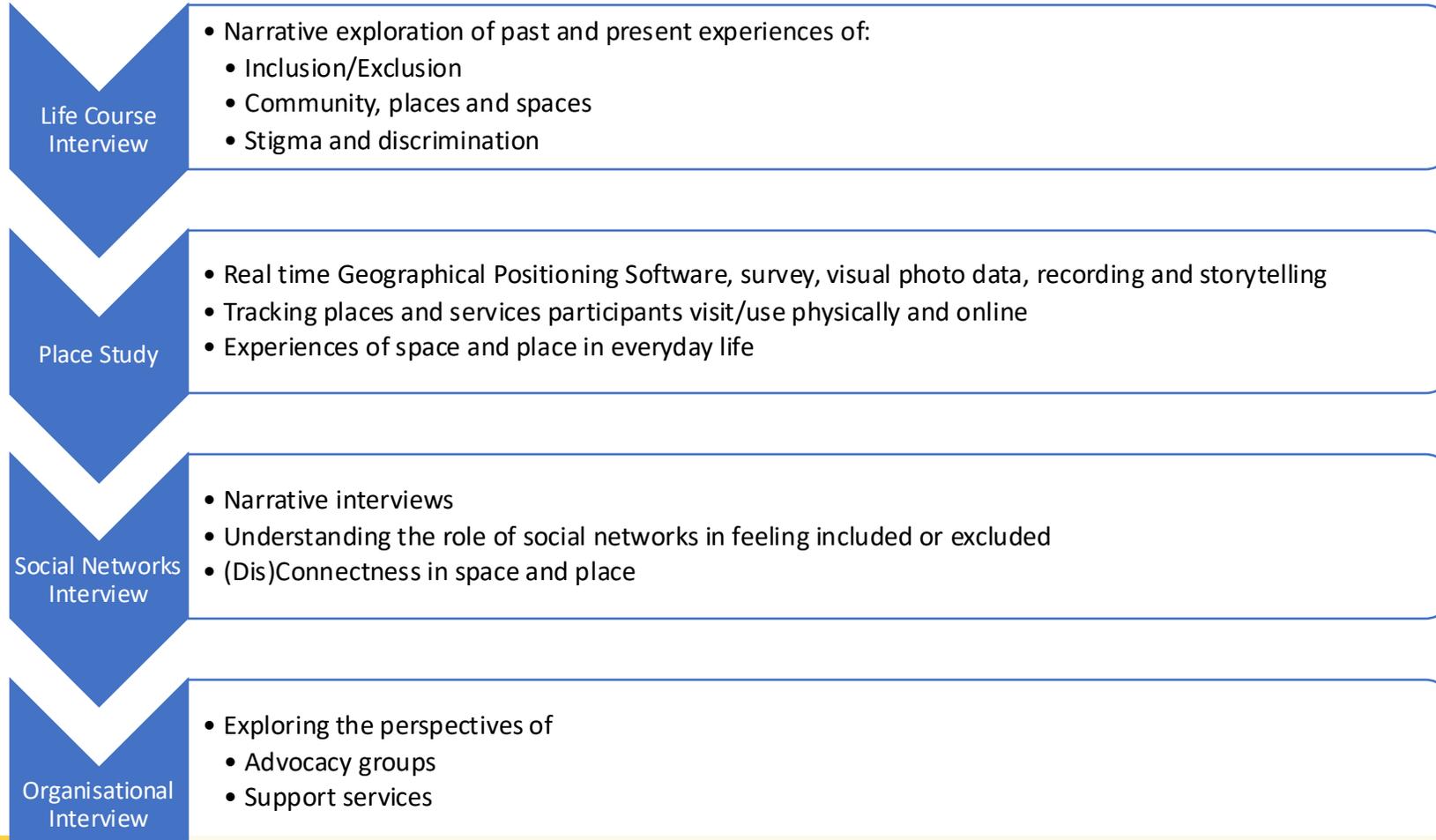
- 5 mid-older LGBT+

- Employed not volunteers = commitment
- Training
- Individual tailored support and handbooks
- Concept discussions/drop-ins
- Protecting Vulnerable Groups Certificate (PVG)

- Agreeing and organising work
- Team training

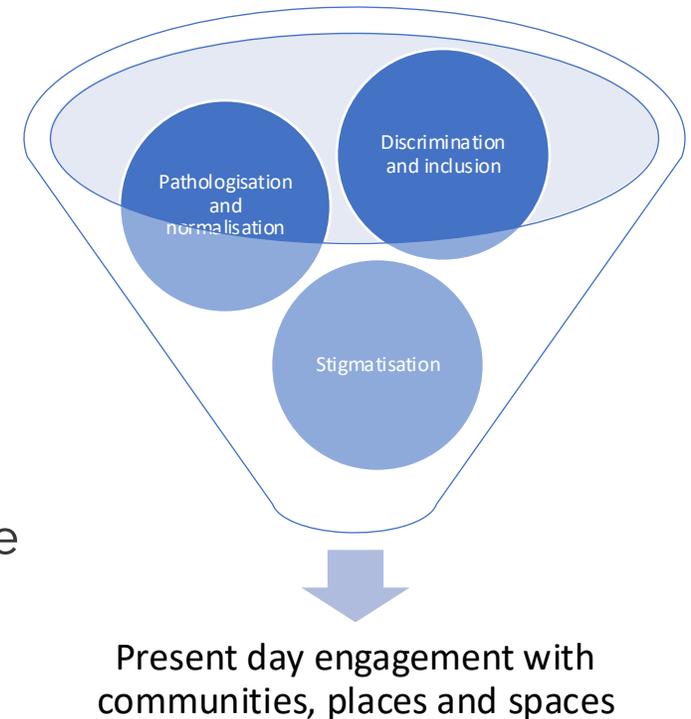

The Life Course Interview

- 80 LGBT+/80 LD narrative interviews
- Understanding diverse histories
 - Interlacing personal & societal past and present
 - Situated belonging
 - Object symbols
 - Paper timelines
- Tracing inequalities to understand cumulative disadvantage
- Experience and identity
 - Past traumas and fears
 - Positive experiences
 - Intersubjective and shared learning



The Place Study

- ArcGIS Online (AGOL) – 2 platforms
 - Geographic Information System
 - **Real time**, locational, survey, qualitative and visual data
- The AGOL Place Study (with 30 LGBT+/LD)
 - Digital/Paper based -4 months, seasonal
 - Experiential 5-15 physical and online communities
 - Survey: Belonging, accessibility, safety, social context
 - Participants record thoughts, feelings, emotions
 - Photographic data capture
- Follow up interview

Social Networks Interview

- 20 participants (LGBT+/LD)
- What role do social networks play in participant understandings of:
 - What community means
 - Connections across time, people and place
 - Inclusion/exclusion in places and spaces
- Create a network map populated by people important to participant
- Explore:
 - Role of relationships in place and space, past and present
 - How they help shape inclusion and exclusion

Organisational Interviews

- Capturing organisational perspectives on inclusionary/exclusionary practices
- 80 interviews
- Public agencies, services, voluntary and community representatives
- Inclusionary challenges
- Risk taking/avoidance

Workshops

- Co-analysis
- Deliberative dialogue
- Visioning
- Knowledge cafes

- Emphasis on diversity: people, knowledges
- Multiple perspectives
- No single instrument delivers all we need to know
- Co-creation at heart of project
- Gain a holistic appreciation of people, place, community
- Empowering based on local knowledge
- Grows skills, expertise and innovation
- Reflexive analysis
